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## GCLA Participates in the M1 for Vets Program

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GCLA is proud to join with "M1 for Vets" which, since its inception in 2005, has given M1 rifles to more than 160 wounded war heroes. This effort is an ongoing process and continues to grow because of the diligence of local shooting clubs around the country desiring to assist "M1 for Vets" and its efforts.

M1 for Vets is a non-profit organization dedicated to financial and logistical support of returning Combat Wounded Veterans from Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF), Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF) and the Global War on Terror (GWT), for the purpose of helping them compete in national shooting sports. The goal is to give transitioning combat wounded veterans an opportunity to get back on the rifle range to participate in shooting competition. These are tough young men and

women who quickly adapt and are able to overcome difficulties.

Most of the work to put the veterans' rifles in top condition is performed by one of the nation's best M1 gunsmiths, Staff Sgt. Isaac McCaskill, a retired Marine Corps armorer.

Broad member Frank Mercer is the driving force behind GCLA's involvement with M1 for Vets. GCLA has already acquired our first M1 Garand for donation to a veteran. Frank will also be heading up the process to find a St. Louis area veteran that will receive the M1 from GCLA. The presentation of the M1 will most likely take place in conjunction with a M1 Garand Match at the Arnold Rifle & Pistol Club.

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## Firearms Legislation In The 111th Congress

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### House:

**H.R. 17** (Bartlett): This bill would reaffirm the right to use firearms for self-defense and for defense of one's home and family.

**H.R. 45** (Rush): This bill would require a license for handguns and semiautomatics, including those currently possessed.

**H.R. 197** (Stearns): This bill would establish national standards for concealed carry reciprocity, but would not protect residents of pro-gun states like Vermont and Alaska which do not require paper permits.

**H.R. 256** (Jackson-Lee): This bill would, among other things, impose a ten-year prison sentence (a life sentence if death or kidnapping results) for using a firearm to cause bodily injury on the basis of race, color, religion, or national origin.

**H.R. 257** (Jackson Lee): This bill would take the already Byzantine restrictions on teaching your kids the responsible use of firearms and extend them from handguns to semi-autos; increase the age of applicability from 18 to 21; and increase potential penalties to up to 10 years in prison.

**H.R. 442** (Rehberg): This bill would provide amnesty for a veteran who acquired a "souvenir" (such as a machine gun) while serving overseas, so long as it is registered during a 90-day grace period.

**H.R. 455** (Welch): This bill would add the Missisquoi and Trout Rivers in Vermont to the Wild and Scenic Rivers system, and commission a study on, among other things, the possession of weapons on lands adjacent to the area.

**H.R. 495** (Rodriguez, Teague, Engel, Reyes): This bill would authorize \$15,000,000 for two years to the BATFE for the purpose of enhancing its project to thwart the transportation of firearms across the Mexican border.

**H.R. 510** (Kind et al.): This bill would provide that the manufacturer's excise tax on recreational equipment be paid quarterly.

**H.R. 623** (Reyes): This bill would suspend minimum sentencing requirements in the case of a person who was authorized to carry a firearm in connection with his employment and committed the crime during and in relation to his employment. (See, also, H.R. 834 and H.R. 866.)

**H.R. 642** (Flake): This bill would provide that, except for overriding reasons such as national security or safety, public lands should be open to recreational shooting. It would generally require that withdrawal of lands from recreational shooting be offset, and would require congressional committees to be notified in writing before such a withdrawal.

**H.R. 673** (Filner, McHugh): This bill would make changes in the federal employee retirement system with respect to certain law enforcement personnel.

**H.R. 675** (Filner): This bill would provide police, criminal investigators, and game law enforcement personnel in the Department of Defense with the authority to execute warrants, make arrests, and carry firearms.

**H.R. 808**: This bill would create a Department of Peace, which would be tasked with, among other things, analyzing policies with respect to "tools of violence, including handguns."

**H.R. 834** (Poe): This bill would suspend minimum sentencing requirements in the case of a person who was authorized to carry a firearm in connection with his employment and committed the crime during and in relation to his employment. (See, also, H.R. 623 and H.R. 866.)

**H.R. 866** (Brady et al.): This bill would suspend minimum sentencing requirements in the case of a person who was authorized to carry a firearm in connection with his employment and committed the crime during and in relation to his employment. (See, also, H.R. 623 and H.R. 834.)

**H.R. 1048** (Sires, Hare, Wilson, Frank, Meek): This bill would prohibit the HUD secretary from accepting any fees for enforcing any provision of a dwelling lease agreement that requires registration of firearms or prohibits their possession for

sport or self-defense.

**H.R. 1074** (Scalise): This bill would allow for the interstate sale of firearms, provided that the laws of the State in which the transfer is conducted and the State of residence of the transferee are complied with, in addition to federal law.

**H.R. 1448** (Rodriguez et al.): Like H.R. 495, this bill would provide \$9,500,000 a year to do things like trace firearms recovered in Mexico, presumably for the purpose of building a case for anti-gun legislation in the U.S.

**H.R. 1620** (Boozman): This "Vermont-friendly" bill would authorize a person who can lawfully carry concealed in his state of residence -- or has a concealed carry permit from any state -- to carry a concealed firearm in all states. Unlike some reciprocity bills, it allows non-permit states like Vermont to benefit from its provisions and does not set "national standards" for carrying firearms.

**H.R. 1684** (Hastings): This bill would codify the Bush Administration's regulations concerning guns in National Parks.

**H.R. 1913** (Conyers, Frank): This is the controversial House-passed Hate Crimes bill. It would impose a 10-year prison sentence for a simple "attempt" to cause bodily injury if a firearm was involved.

**H.R. 2159** (King of New York, Rangel, McCarthy, et al.): This bill would allow Eric Holder to declare any person a "prohibited person" (revoke licenses of, etc.) if he "suspects" that individual of aiding terrorism.

**H.R. 2296** (King, Space): This is a reincarnation of a bill which contains a hodge-podge of relatively minor good things -- and one really bad thing which was used to secure the cosponsorship of the Judiciary Committee Chairman on the Senate version of the bill. The bad thing is that the bill would allow BATFE to impose, for the first time, civil penalties on federal firearms licensees.

**H.R. 2324** (Castle, McCarthy, et al.): This bill is a reincarnation of the year-after-year effort to effectively ban gun shows by allowing them to be regulated and inspected to an unlimited extent.

**H.R. 2401** (McCarthy): This bill is a reincarnation of legislation to make "prohibited persons" of everyone on an administration "terrorist watch list." Suffice it to say that:

- there are virtually no guidelines to who can or can't be placed on one of these lists, and they have prohibited boarding by people like Ted Kennedy;
- it is impossible to find out why you are on the list and very difficult to get your name off.

### Senate:

**S. 160**: This is the Senate-passed bill to grant a voting representative for the District of Columbia in the House. As a result of an amendment added on the Senate floor by Senator John Ensign, it would repeal the gun registration and microstamping provisions of D.C. law, and would bar the District from passing new anti-gun statutes.

**S. 296** (Chambliss, Cornyn, Coburn, Isakson): This bill would replace the federal income tax with a national sales tax. Although the language is a little muddy, it appears that the 1934 National Firearms Act is retained.

**S. 325** (Cochran): The bill would allow pest control pyrotechnics to be exempted from the explosives provisions of Title 18.

**S. 371** (Thune, Vitter): This "Vermont-friendly" bill would authorize a person who can lawfully carry concealed in his state of residence -- or has a concealed carry permit from any state -- to carry a concealed firearm in all states. Unlike some reciprocity bills, it allows non-permit states like Vermont to benefit from its provisions and does not set "national standards" for carrying firearms.

**S. 556** (Vitter): Current law allows long guns to be purchased in a face-to-face transaction with a gun dealer in a state outside the purchaser's state of residence. This bill:

- \* extends that law to all firearms;
- \* allows the gun to be purchased at a gun show; and
- \* rescinds provisions that allow the state of residence to reach into another state and prohibit a transaction which has nothing to do with its jurisdiction.

**S. 632** (Baucus et al.): This bill would provide that the manufacturer's excise tax on recreational equipment be paid quarterly.

**S. 669** (Burr): This bill would protect veterans by first requiring a finding by a judge or magistrate that an individual is mentally incompetent before his guns are taken away under laws administered by the Department of Veterans Affairs.

**S. 816** (Crapo): This bill would codify the Bush Administration's regulations concerning guns in National Parks.

**S. 845** (Thune, Vitter): This is the GOA-supported "Vermont-friendly" concealed carry reciprocity bill.

**S. 941** (Crapo, Leahy): This is the Senate counterpart to H.R. 2296 and is a reincarnation of a bill which contains a hodge-podge of relatively minor good things -- and one really bad thing which was used to secure the cosponsorship of Judiciary Committee Chairman Pat Leahy. The bad thing is that the bill would allow BATFE to impose, for the first time, civil penalties on federal firearms licensees.

**S. 1317** (Lautenberg): This bill would allow the Attorney General to deny the purchase of a firearm pursuant to an Instantcheck (or a permit which would allow a person to by-pass the Instantcheck) if he "suspect[s]" that the person has been engaged in conduct "related to terrorism" and the Attorney General has a "reasonable belief" that the firearm might be used in connection with terrorism.

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## Obama signs gun law, but effective date delayed

WASHINGTON -- Not so fast, gun owners. A new law allowing loaded guns in national parks and wildlife refuges will not take effect until next year, the Obama administration said Friday.

President Barack Obama signed the gun law Friday as part of a measure creating new rules for the credit card industry.

But a spokeswoman for the Interior Department said that because the credit card law won't take effect until nine months after it is signed, the

gun measure also will be delayed.

Spokeswoman Kendra Barkoff said the Interior Department will follow Congress' directive and put the new firearms law into effect in February 2010.

Until then, rules adopted under the Reagan administration will remain in place. The rules severely restrict guns in the national parks, generally requiring that guns be locked or stored in a glove compartment or trunk.

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## NINTH CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS HOLDS THAT THE SECOND AMENDMENT APPLIES TO THE STATES

Tuesday, April 21, 2009

Fairfax, Va. -- Today, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit marked a milestone in Second Amendment history by ruling that the Second Amendment limits state and local government infringements on our right to keep and bear arms through the due process clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. NRA has been involved in, and supportive of, this case for the past ten years and has filed several amicus briefs in the case.

"The historic Heller decision was a major victory for law-abiding gun owners and recognized that the federal government could not infringe on our right to keep and bear arms," said Chris W. Cox, NRA chief lobbyist. "Today's decision, which applies to the states in the Ninth Circuit, ensures that the fundamental freedoms affirmed in Heller are not just limited to the residents of Washington, D.C."

In 1999, the Alameda County Board of Supervisors passed an ordinance that made it a misdemeanor to possess a firearm on county property, effectively banning gun shows. This ordinance affected a local business, owned by Russell and Sallie Nordyke, which promotes gun shows throughout California. In an attempt to continue holding their gun shows

on the Alameda county fairgrounds property, the Nordykes filed suit to strike down the ordinance.

The U.S. Court of Appeals upheld the ordinance banning guns on county property, but found, consistent with the views of most Second Amendment scholars, that the Second Amendment protects the right to keep and bear arms for all law-abiding Americans. NRA is also pursuing litigation on that issue in Chicago and Oak Park, Illinois. That case is currently pending before the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit.

"The NRA shares the Nordykes' disappointment with the ruling on the county ordinance, as gun shows should not be discriminated against by local government entities. The incorporation portion of the decision, however, is a major step forward in enshrining our Second Amendment freedoms," said Cox.

"This decision brings us closer to seeing Heller applied throughout the land," concluded Cox. "After nearly 10 years of litigation, the hard work of the Nordykes, their attorneys, Donald Kilmer and Don Kates, and NRA's legal team has resulted in today's historic decision."

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## GOA APPLAUDS CALL TO ACTION ON JUDGE SOTOMAYOR FROM NRA'S PAST PRESIDENT

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## NRA MEMBERS MUST OPPOSE SOTOMAYOR BY SANDY FROMAN

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Wednesday, June 24, 2009

Judge Sonia Sotomayor, President Barack Obama's first nominee to the U.S. Supreme Court, has a narrow view of the Second Amendment that contradicts the Court's landmark decision in *District of Columbia v. Heller*. A heated debate has started in the U.S. Senate over her opposition to the right to keep and bear arms. This issue, which has decided the fate of presidential elections, could also decide her nomination. Gun owners, and especially the members of the National Rifle Association, must aggressively oppose Judge Sotomayor's confirmation to the Supreme Court.

On June 24, senators began speaking on the floor of the Senate expressing grave concerns over Judge Sotomayor's Second Amendment record. Senator Jeff Sessions R-AL, the Ranking Member of the Senate Judiciary Committee, pointed out that although her record on the issue is "fairly scant," she has twice stated that the Second Amendment is not a fundamental right. Senator Sessions also noted that in Second Amendment and other constitutional cases, Sotomayor's analysis of important constitutional issues has been lacking suggesting "a troubling tendency to avoid or casually dismiss difficult Constitutional issues of exceptional importance." Sotomayor's view on the Second Amendment clearly reflects an extreme anti-gun philosophy, and some Democrat senators from pro-gun states are justifiably nervous.

Last year, the Supreme Court held in *Heller* that the Second Amendment guarantees the right of individual Americans to keep and bear firearms. But that ruling was a fiercely-contested, 5-4 split decision. Justice Kennedy joined the four conservatives on the Court to make the majority, with the four liberal justices writing passionate dissents about how the Second Amendment does not apply to private citizens.

Bluntly speaking, the Second Amendment survived by a single vote. Had one justice voted differently, the Second Amendment would have been erased from the Bill of Rights forever. Today in the Supreme Court, the right to bear arms hangs by a single vote.

The next question the Supreme Court will decide is whether the Second Amendment is a "fundamental right" that applies to cities and states, thus preventing them from restricting gun rights. Even the liberal Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals held earlier this year in *Nordyke v. King* that the Second Amendment is a fundamental right, yet Judge Sotomayor disagrees.

When Barack Obama nominated Sonia Sotomayor to the Supreme Court, it belied his flowery rhetoric about respecting our constitutional gun rights. Out of almost 200 federal appeals judges in this country,

Judge Sotomayor is one of only six to weigh in (after the *Heller* case) to hold that the Second Amendment only limits federal actions. If your state or city chooses to ban all guns or take away the ones that you already have in your home for hunting and self-defense, Sonia Sotomayor says the Constitution can't help you.

This position becomes all the more radical when it's revealed how she reached this conclusion. Only six judges have denied gun rights against the states. Of these, three did so in a recent Seventh Circuit case, *NRA v. Chicago*, writing a detailed opinion that the Second Amendment doesn't apply to the states because they thought an old 1800s Supreme Court case tied their hands on the issue, and they commended the case up to the Supreme Court after long and scholarly consideration. Judge Sotomayor and two of her liberal colleagues, however, wrote only a single paragraph on the whole issue when deciding their own New York case, *Maloney v. Cuomo*. In one paragraph, she said the Second Amendment gives people no rights at all when it comes to state or city laws. She gave no explanation, and made no call for Supreme Court action.

Then we find that this has been a consistent belief for Sotomayor. In a case before her in 2004, she and her colleagues concluded that there is no fundamental right in the Second Amendment but provided no substantive analysis to justify this conclusion. Throughout her career, Judge Sotomayor's record is one of consistent opposition to the private ownership of firearms.

America has almost 90 million gun owners who value their rights. And of these, no one does more to protect the Second Amendment than the four million members of the National Rifle Association.

I served as an officer of the NRA for nine years, including a two-year term as president. I saw NRA members turn the tide on Election Day 2000 to defeat Al Gore. We fought again to help defeat John Kerry in 2004. We can do the same with Sonia Sotomayor, if we call our U.S. Senators and tell them to vote against this anti-gun judge. No fewer than fourteen Democrat senators have solid records on the Second Amendment, and we must urge them to oppose this nominee.

Next year, the Supreme Court is likely to take up *NRA v. Chicago*, which will decide whether the Second Amendment applies to states and cities like it does the federal government. This case is as important as *Heller*, and will massively impact gun rights forever.

We already know where Judge Sotomayor stands. It's time to tell the Senate, "Vote No! on Sonia Sotomayor."

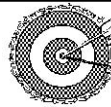

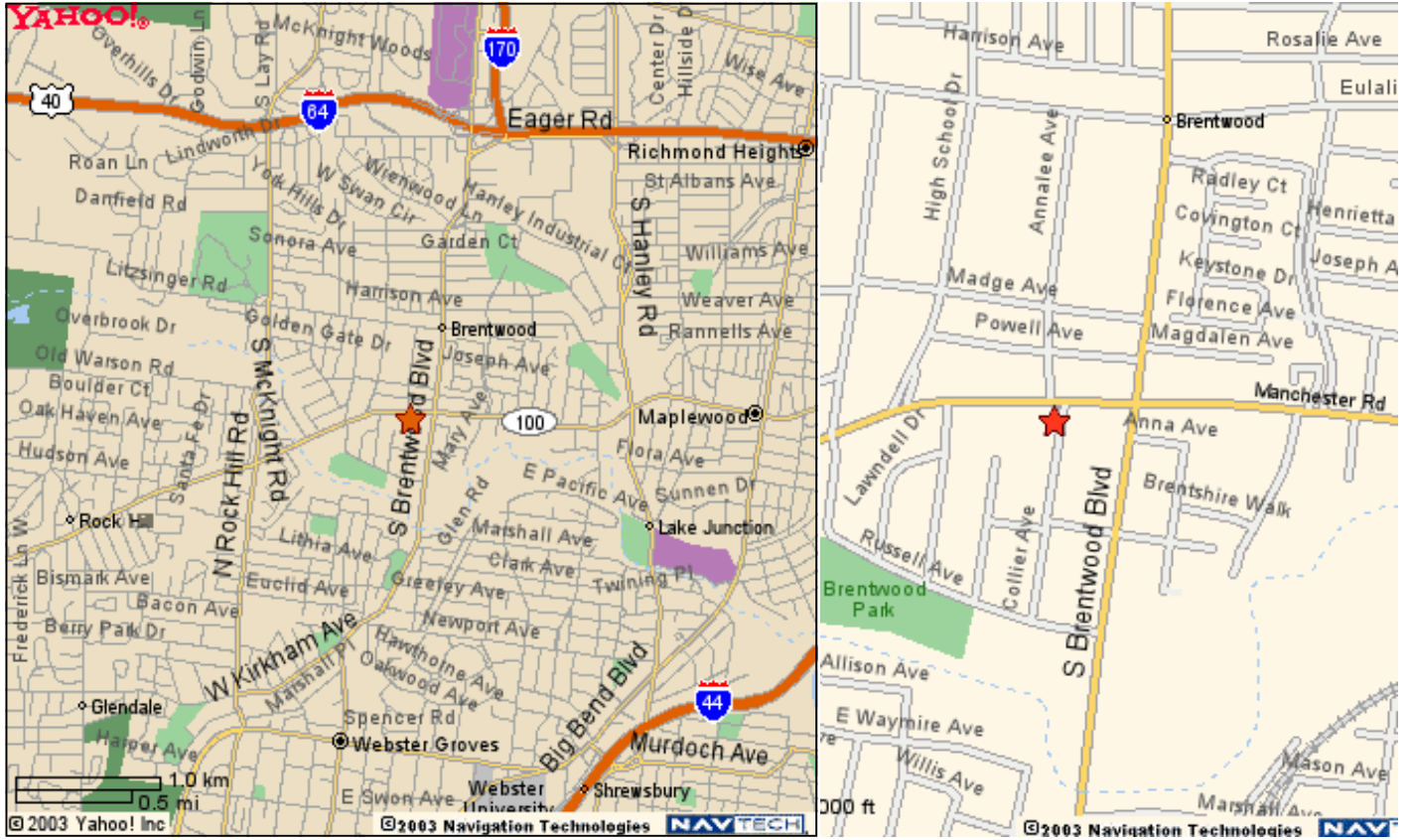
If you are not an NRA member and you want to become one, we can also do that.
